78	Chair Wendy Jacobs called the m	eeting to order at 9:00 a.m. A roll call of MPO Board Member
79	and Alternates was performed. The Votir	ng Members and Alternate Voting Members of the DCHC MPO
80	Board were identified and are indicated	above.
81		PRELIMINARIES:
82	2. Ethics Reminder	
83	Chair Wendy Jacobs read the Eth	ics Reminder and asked if there were any known conflicts of
84	interest with respect to matters coming	before the MPO Board and requested that if there were any
85	identified during the meeting for them to	be announced. There were no known conflicts identified by
86	the MPO Board Members.	

87	3. Adjustments to the Agenda
88	There were no adjustments to the agenda.
89	<u>4. Public Comments</u>
90	Chair Wendy Jacobs stated that Erik Landfried submitted a public comment to the MPO Board,
91	which will be submitted for the record.
92	John Tallmadge requested that the MPO Board receive public comment for agenda item #9, TIP
93	Amendment #3, and agenda item #10, Draft FY2022 UPWP. John Tallmadge requested that future
94	agenda items demonstrate to residents how they are in alignment with MPO Goals and Objectives, as
95	well as present alternatives.
96	5. Directives to Staff
97	Damon Seils explained that there is an effort to hire a consultant to review the organization and
98	administration of the MPO. Damon Seils continued that a Request for Information (RFI) was released,
99	and an information session was organized with potential bidders. Damon Seils added that the due date
100	for applications is December 16, 2020.
101	CONSENT AGENDA:
102	6. November 4, 2020 Board Meeting Minutes
103	Chair Wendy Jacobs asked about the follow-up for the 15-501 corridor study report from the
104	previous MPO Board meeting on November 4. Aaron Cain responded that MPO staff would brief the
105	MPO Board at the next MPO Board meeting on January 13, 2021.
106	Pam Hemminger made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda. Vice Chair Jenn Weaver
107	seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.
108 109	ACTION ITEMS:
109 110 111 112	<u>7. Joint MPO Board Recap</u> Wendy Jacobs, Board Chair Aaron Cain, LPA Staff

113 Chair Wendy Jacobs summarized the information that was presented at the Joint DCHC MPO 114 and Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO) Board meeting on December 1 that 115 occurred virtually. Chair Wendy Jacobs added that U.S. Representative David Price, Chairman of the Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Committee, provided attendees 116 117 with a forecast of a future recovery bill that he believes will focus on infrastructure. Chair Wendy 118 Jacobs stated that Rep. Price advised how the MPOs could position themselves to receive federal 119 funding. Chair Wendy Jacobs relayed that advice was given for the MPOs to partner with groups that 120 have similar interests. Chair Wendy Jacobs requested that MPO staff update the policy priorities 121 documents before the next Joint MPO Meeting in January 2021. 122 This item was for discussion purposes only. 123 8. Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) Amendment #2 124 Andy Henry, LPA Staff Chair Wendy Jacobs stated that Amendment #2 to the Comprehensive Transportation Plan 125 (CTP) was discussed at the MPO Board meeting on November 4, and Andy Henry would provide an 126 127 update for this item. Andy Henry stated that the consensus is to remove the Briggs Avenue Extension 128 because the bridge is prohibitively expensive. Andy Henry added that residents of this area are in support of the removal of the Briggs Avenue Extension in the CTP. 129 130 Chair Wendy Jacobs opened the public hearing. Patrick Byker confirmed his support of the 131 deletion of the Briggs Avenue Extension. Chair Wendy Jacobs closed the public hearing and noted 132 that the public comment period will be extended for an additional 24 hours following the public 133 hearing. 134 Pam Hemminger made a motion adopt Amendment #2 to the Comprehensive Transportation 135 Plan (CTP). Damon Seils seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

#### 136 9. TIP Amendment #3

137 Anne Phillips, LPA Staff

138 Aaron Cain stated that he will present the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment #3 instead of Anne Phillips, who is on leave. Aaron Cain stated that TIP Amendment #3 139 140 would advance the Woodcroft Parkway Extension (U-5823) project because the City of Durham has 141 already used planning funding on this project, and a construction delay until FY31, which was 142 proposed by NCDOT in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) reprogramming 143 exercise, would unduly burden and make irrelevant the work this City of Durham has already done 144 on this project. Aaron Cain added that TIP Amendment #3 would instead move Woodcroft Parkway 145 Extension into construction in FY25. Aaron Cain noted that NCDOT has been consulted on this 146 change, and they concurred. Aaron Cain stated that three additional projects impacted by this 147 change in the TIP would be Third Fork Creek Trail (EB-5837), Guess Road Sidewalks (EB-5834), and NC 55 Sidewalks (EB-5835). Aaron Cain continued that the Third Fork Creek Trail will be delayed two 148 149 years and the other two projects are underfunded and would not advance on the schedule currently 150 shown in the STIP.

Charlie Reece requested to have a 21-day public comment period for TIP Amendment #3. Charlie Reece stated that he would advocate for funding from the City of Durham's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) budget during in the upcoming budget process. Heidi Carter asked about coordination for the Woodcraft Parkway Extension with Jordan High School. Aaron Cain and Bill Judge commented that schools, including Jordan High School, are included in design discussions. Javiera Caballero voiced her support for the 21-day public comment period.

157 Chair Wendy Jacobs requested that MPO staff provide a template for how they present 158 information to residents that explains how the MPO goals and visions align with matters coming 159 before the MPO Board. Chair Wendy Jacobs suggested that MPO staff review agenda templates from 160 local jurisdictions, including the City of Durham.

161 Charlie Reece made a motion to institute a 21-day public comment period for TIP

162 Amendment #3. Vice Chair Jenn Weaver seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

### 163 10. Draft FY2022 Unified Planning Work Program

164 Felix Nwoko, LPA Staff

Felix Nwoko stated that the DCHC MPO is required by federal regulations to prepare an annual 165 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) that details and guides the urban area transportation planning 166 activities. Felix Nwoko continued that funding for the UPWP is provided by the Federal Highway 167 168 Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Felix Nwoko added that the UPWP must identify MPO planning tasks to be performed with the use of federal transportation funds. Felix 169 170 Nwoko stated that he will send the updated presentation to the MPO Board following the meeting. 171 Felix Nwoko discussed several new features of the UPWP. Felix Nwoko explained that the new 172 features were a way to link the UPWP to the goals of the MPO, including those concerning climate change and safety. There was discussion about using roll-over funds for other projects, including studies 173 174 of the US 70 corridor. Felix Nwoko discussed Lead Planning Agency (LPA) expenses and the MPO 175 organizational chart. There was discussion about spending funds on additional studies rather than 176 infrastructure projects. Chair Wendy Jacobs and Felix Nwoko responded that the US 70 corridor study 177 was in response to another road project, which was a time sensitive issue. 178 There was discussion about further clarifying the UPWP and answering questions from the MPO 179 Board before it is released for the 21-day public comment period. There was consensus among the MPO 180 Board to have further discussions with LPA staff before this item is brought back to the MPO Board on 181 January 13, 2021. 182 11. Draft Public Involvement Policy (PIP) and Limited English Proficiency Plan (LEP)

183 Anne Phillips, LPA Staff

Aaron Cain stated that the original Public Involvement Policy (PIP) was adopted in 2012 based
on comments from the MPO's certification review by FHWA in 2011. Aaron Cain continued that the PIP

- and the Limited English Proficiency Plan (LEP) have been updated based on requirements from the Fixing
- 187 America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act and updated data from the American Communities Survey.
- Aaron Cain added that data from the 2020 Census could impact the PIP and the LEP, so a review of
- 189 Census data will be conducted upon its release, likely in the latter half of 2021.
- 190 Javiera Caballero requested that staff provide her with related materials to distribute to the
- 191 Latinx community. Chair Wendy Jacobs asked how additional requirements in the PIP and LEP, such as
- additional translation requirements, would be funded. Aaron Cain responded that there is no additional
- 193 funding for these items. Chair Wendy Jacobs suggested that the MPO partner with local governments to
- 194 share resources for plan implementation.
- 195 Damon Seils made a motion to release the draft PIP and LEP for a 45-day public comment
- 196 period. Pam Hemminger seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.
- 197 **<u>12. Orange County Transit Plan Update</u>**
- 198Caroline Dwyer, Renaissance Planning Group

199 Caroline Dwyer stated that the Orange County Transit Plan is ending its phase one of context

- 200 gathering and public engagement, and beginning its phase two of developing conceptual transit
- scenarios. Caroline Dwyer stated that the public survey, transit summary, transit brochure, and regional
- 202 connections opportunity report have all been completed. Caroline Dwyer discussed the public
- 203 engagement process and the comments that were provided by the public.

204 Chair Wendy Jacobs requested that presentations be provided to the MPO Board prior to the

205 MPO Board meeting. Damon Seils noted that coordination between the Orange County Transit Plan and

- the Durham County Transit Plan is necessary. Renee Price asked about participation in the surveys.
- 207 Caroline Dwyer noted that the demographics of survey respondents largely matched with the overall

demographics of Orange County. Renee Price noted that she prefers to see more engagement from the

209 public, while adding that there is a growing Mandarin speaking population.

- 210 Vice Chair Jenn Weaver discussed the importance of creating healthy communities, reducing the
- 211 impacts of climate change, and getting residents out of single occupancy vehicles. Chair Wendy Jacobs
- discussed the importance of working with regional transportation partners. Caroline Dwyer responded
- that there have been ongoing discussions between regional partners. Chair Wendy Jacobs requested
- additional information about jobs centers to be included.

- 216 **<u>13. Durham County Transit Plan Update</u>**

217 Aaron Cain, LPA Staff

- 218 Brooke Ganser, Durham City-Council Planning
- 219 Aidil Ortiz, Engagement Consultant

220 Brooke Ganser stated that the first public outreach period consisted of workshops, surveys, and 221 Engagement Ambassadors. Brooke Ganser added that the survey will close in mid-December 2020. Aidil 222 Ortiz explained that the Engagement Ambassadors program was necessary because the survey largely 223 missed low-income and minority residents. Aidil Ortiz added that there are currently 36 engagement 224 ambassadors that have been trained to reach residents that traditional outreach methods often 225 overlook. 226 Aaron Cain explained that the existing conditions report will review the usefulness of current and possible projects within the next 20 years. Aaron Cain stated that, for the Durham County Transit 227 228 Plan, there has been collaboration with regional partners. Aaron Cain continued the Durham Transit 229 Plan Technical Committee is helping to update and refine the forecast of travel propensity and demand 230 based on demographics, Environmental Justice (EJ), race, income, and access to personal vehicles. Aaron 231 Cain stated that the future ridership of transit is being forecasted. Aaron Cain added that bus stop 232 amenities are being reviewed as well as compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Aaron Cain discussed that all new projects within potential plan scenarios will be financially constrained. 233 Aaron Cain stated that there would not be many new expenditures in the near future. 234

235	Aaron Cain stated that the next steps include completing a needs and gaps analysis to later
236	combine with further outreach efforts. Aaron Cain noted that there is a scenario development meeting
237	on December 17, and there will be two more meetings in January and February. Aaron Cain added that
238	the schedule for the Durham County Transit Plan will include three potential scenarios for comment in
239	February 2021, the final scenario for public comment in late spring 2021, the final report in summer
240	2021. Aaron Cain added that approval from governing boards will likely be in fall 2021.
241	Charlie Reece and Aaron Cain discussed how public input was solicited concerning fiscally
242	constrained projects. Charlie Reece and Javiera Caballero highlighted that the majority of transit users
243	are low-income and minority riders. Chair Wendy Jacobs added that the role of transit is also to provide
244	service to residents to large job centers.
245	This item was for informational purposes only.
246 247	<u>14. Greater Triangle Commuter Rail Update</u> Jay Heikes, GoTriangle
248	Jay Heikes stated that the previous Greater Triangle Commuter Rail update occurred in August
249	2020. Jay Heikes added that the primary outcome of this study is to develop a project concept that
250	defines the number and schedules of trains as well as determines station locations and infrastructure.
251	Jay Heikes continued that the goal is to reach a regional consensus among stakeholders and regional

- decision makers about when to start project design and construction. Jay Heikes discussed the
- challenges of construction in downtown Durham. Jay Heikes noted that the first round of public
- 254 engagement has been completed.
- 255 Charlie Reese, Michael Parker, and Chair Wendy Jacobs discussed possible cost share scenarios
- 256 for the commuter rail.
- 257 This item was for informational purposes only.

# <u>15. FY20 Triangle Transit Tax Annual Report</u> Jennifer Hayden, GoTriangle

260	Jennifer Hayden stated that, according to the FY20 Triangle Transit Tax Annual Report, transit
261	programs continued despite disruptions from the COVID-19 pandemic. Jennifer Hayden noted the
262	completion of large construction projects, including bus stops. Jennifer Hayden stated that Durham
263	County has long-range goals to connect more residents with jobs, expand capacity, and provide better
264	regional connections. Jennifer Hayden stated that funding for Durham and Orange counties were both
265	lower than the amount budgeted, which was due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
266	Chair Wendy Jacobs and Pam Hemminger requested that a one-page document be created for
267	residents to easily understand the benefits of the transit tax. Jennifer Hayden and Saundra Freeman
268	responded that the information has previously been available on the website.
269	This item was for informational purposes only.
270 271	<u>16. DCHC MPO Board Officer Nominations</u> Aaron Cain, LPA Staff
272	Damon Seils stated that he, along with Karen Howard and Charlie Reece, comprised the
273	nominating committee. Damon Seils added that their recommendation for the MPO Board officers for
274	2021 were Wendy Jacobs as Chair and Jenn Weaver as Vice Chair.
275	Damon Seils, as a member of the Nominating Committee, made a motion to elect Wendy Jacobs
276	as Chair and Jenn Weaver as Vice Chair of the DCHC MPO Board for 2021. Pam Hemminger seconded
277	the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

- repairs. David Keilson announced that the overall completion date is late fall 2021
- 296 David Keilson stated that the Old Durham/Chapel Hill project is continuing to work on utility

- 298 David Keilson stated that the completion date for the East End Connector project is June 2021
- 299 David Keilson added that the delay from December 2020 to June 2021 was due to complications in
- 300 coordination with the railroads.
- 301 Pat Wilson, Division 7, stated that there is no additional report. Pam Hemminger asked about
- 302 the I-40 widening project schedule. Pat Wilson responded that North Carolina Department of
- 303 Transportation is working on development, and the let date would be in 2022. Pat Wilson added that
- 304 he will contact local governments during the development process.

- 306 schedule to begin in spring 2021.
- 307 Bryan Kluchar, Division 8, stated that there are no additional updates.
